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## Geography of the Imagination

*(Below is an excerpt from an uplifting message given at our Annual Assembly in March. Dr. Michael Reid Trice shared his thoughts on "Thinking Globally, Acting Locally: Gift and Challenge for the Ecumenical Community." Dr. Trice, a newly-elected member of the board, is Assistant Dean for Ecumenical and Interreligious Dialogue at Seattle University's School of Theology and Ministry.)*

"The historian Stephen Ambrose reminds us that when Lewis and Clark's Corps of Discovery crossed the Continental Divide, they expected to drop quickly into a valley and slip onward to the Pacific Ocean. When instead they peered over a ridge and saw the hacksaw Bitterroot Mountains stretching out in seemingly



endless passes, the **geography of their expectation** was confronted by an immediate and new **geography of the imagination**.

Where is the geography of our imagination taking us as a church here in Seattle, our country and the world? Isn't it the case that the future of our course will take place in bodies such as this council of churches, designed specifically for this purpose?

Our Christian walk in the 21st Century will be the work of love turned into a call for renewal, a call for greater unity transformed into a global/local unity and an integrated voice in response to the challenge of our time. It takes courage of an undaunted kind."

Pick up a bargain and boost your blessings at the same time! The Sharehouse turns housing into homes. They partner with 60 agencies


that bring recently-homeless families to “shop” for furnishings at The Sharehouse’s warehouse of donated items. Funds raised from the rummage sale will support program operations.

## New VISTAs



Bryn always knew she wanted to make a difference. “When I got out of college I tried desperately to get a social justice job, but couldn’t get in the door. Then I heard about AmeriCorps-VISTA.” Bryn joined our SoundYouth VISTA program 2.5 months ago, and was placed with Hepatitis Education Project. She works with youth – often low-income drug users. “Did you know hepatitis is now killing more people

than HIV? And there are almost no education programs about it.” Bryn found the path of involvement she wanted. “Now I understand how to do community organizing. I see we really can make a difference on significant problems. I understand where poverty comes from. I am thrilled to be here.”

Bryn found this yearlong service position through a program of the Church

Council, that provides service opportunities for young adults and boosts the organizational capacity of non-profits serving low-income youth in the region.

Roberto Felipe Maestas is a legendary figure in Seattle, a fearless advocate for Latino peoples and founder of El Centro de la Raza. ## Executive Director's Corner:

### Racism diminishes us all

Let me share with you from our statement to the broad community:

"The Church Council of Greater Seattle expresses its profound concern and outrage over the killing of Trayvon Martin in Sanford, Florida. In addition to sharing our grief with his family and friends, we denounce the taking of an innocent life on the presumption that because of dress and race a person would be considered threatening. Every human being is a child of God with a fundamental dignity that must be honored and

respected." The message sent by the circumstances in Trayvon Martin's violent death in Sanford, Florida, is all too similar to the killing of John T. Williams in Seattle: "people of color are naturally suspicious, and violent crimes against people of color are more acceptable."

The Department of Justice recently released a report that found the Seattle Police Department administers its work inequitably, especially with regard to use of force toward people of color. The Church Council worked with local pas-

tors in convening a broad, multiracial table to sit down with Mayor McGinn to insist on adequate and prompt follow up to that report.

More work is being planned to "let justice roll" in our community, confronting and overcoming the systemic racism that dehumanizes us all. If you would like to join with us, contact me.

## New Project Tackles Family Homelessness

What will it take to end family homelessness?

A new coalition brings together academic research, local activism, philanthropic dollars, and spiritual communities to tackle the crisis. Seattle University's School of Theology and Ministry (STM) is at the helm, as they launch the Faith & Family Homelessness Project, which will involve 14 congregations in 3 Puget Sound counties.

Six King County faith communities were selected to receive high-quality leadership and support through the creation of new relationships, platforms, and models for successful faith-based advocacy. Congrats to the congregations who were selected in a hotly competitive process:

Alki United Church of Christ; Islamic Center, Shoreline; Masjid Al-Karim; New Life Church, Renton;

Peoples Institutional Baptist Church; Temple De Hirsch-Sinai, Seattle/Bellevue.
